

## Dear Friends,

Asha Deep Vidyashram has made it through the second trimester of the current school year. We had our term exams just before Christmas with another couple of weeks of school before the District Magistrate declared all schools closed because of extreme cold. This happens every year when temperatures dip down to the forties. The forties may not sound so bad to you, but when students have to get up (many having never really gotten warm all night), take cold water bucket baths, come to school wearing a thin acrylic sweater, often wearing only flip-flops, it's cold. We've tried to help by purchasing sweaters in a range of sizes which the children can borrow for the winter



season. But it doesn't help their bottoms and legs! At school we have thin mats which provide a slight cushion most of the year, but scant protection against the frigid cement floors this time of year. At these temperatures, in buildings that are designed to be cool (as you need most of the year), it really is hard just to hold on to a pencil and write. So, we are now on enforced vacation, one in which a primary goal is just to stay warm. During the day, after the fog burns off, we may get some sunny hours which help. In the evenings and mornings, every few feet you see people gathered (as in the photo below) around small wood fires for warmth.



School will probably re-open on the 16th, after which the weather will gradually warm up to tolerable by the first or second week of February. By the end of March, we'll be sweating again!

During the past term, we had some special events including Children's Day and a Christmas party! In India, Children's Day is celebrated on November 14th, Jahawarlal Nehru's birthday. Nehru was India's first prime minister, the man in charge when India was granted independence by the British in August 1947. A friend of Gandhi and well-respected for his leadership, Nehru is also famous for his love of children. One story is told about the time he was passing through south

India in a motorcade. He caught sight of a balloon vendor and ordered the procession to stop. Approaching the streetside hawker, Nehru bought all the balloons in stock and asked that they be distributed to the children in the crowd. To this day, Nehru is often referred to as "Chacha Nehru" or "Uncle Nehru" because of the love and care with which he ruled his people and because of his kindness to children.

On Children's Day, we try to do something special for our students. This year we celebrated by inviting Wilbur Sargunaraj to our school. Born in south India, Wilbur is widely known as India's first YouTube sensation. His wacky

videos have received over 5.5 million views. A friend of close friends of the school, Wilbur agreed to come! With a mission of "making the common man extraordinary," Wilbur is no stranger to making children happy.
